

Labour's vote share has remained fairly steady throughout the campaign, as the Conservatives' has fallen.

Reform UK and the Liberal Democrats have both seen increases in their vote share since the start of the campaign.

A "presidential" campaign is not helping Rishi Sunak

After this General Election, who do you most want to be Prime Minister?




The campaign has not done much to change which party leader the public would most want to see as Prime Minister, with numbers stuck at around 25 per cent preferring Sunak and 43 per cent preferring Starmer.

Net approval rating




The campaign period has pushed Starmer into net positive approval, whereas Sunak's net approval has only fallen, although both leaders have seen a slight tick up in the last week.

% going well - % going badly




People have noticed a number of high-profile Conservative gaffes this campaign, which has increased the number of people saying that the Conservative campaign is going badly.

From what you've seen and read, would you say that these parties' election campaigns are...




This week we tested how well people think more parties' campaigns are going.

As the campaign has progressed, people have become more convinced that the Labour Party is ready to form a government.










Labour's first steps tend to be very popular individually, with the measures on the NHS top of the list.

One problem for Labour is the low cut-through of their popular policies, with most people still saying they are unclear about what Labour stands for.

Unlike with the Conservative manifesto, people think that the Labour policies represent change and are aimed at people like them. A plurality also think that their policies will make their lives better

Change

Despite some grumbling from progressives, the public do not think that Labour isn't being ambitious enough. In fact, the public are three times more likely to think that Labour is being overly ambitious.



Give everyone a new right to see a GP in seven days, or 24 hours if it is urgent, with extra doctors recruited to make it happen

Give big companies a duty to protect the environment and ban water companies from dumping raw sewage

Introduce free personal care for disabled or elderly people who need help with daily tasks

Investing in renewable energy and home insulation with the aim of bringing energy bills down

Seek a closer relationship with the European Union, including rejoining the Single Market

Change the country's voting system to proportional representation and cap donations to political parties


The Liberal Democrats have also announced a number of popular individual policies, particularly on the NHS and on sewage polluters.

The proposal to rejoin the Single Market attracts the most opposition, and is overwhelmingly rejected by those who voted to leave in the EU referendum (49% oppose, 25% support).

And thinking about that set of policies as a whole, would you say...



The Liberal Democrats' policies are narrowly ahead of Labour's on four of these five tests, although Labour is ahead slightly on whether the policies will help fix the country's biggest issues.

Importantly, these policies meet the sweet spot of both being the most likely for people to think represent change, while also being the most likely for people to say are the right level of ambition.






Some of Reform's policies are just as popular as those set out in other manifestos - but they also attract more opposition from some groups.

Tough measures on crime and immigration does attract high support, although scrapping all net zero targets receives net opposition.

And thinking about that set of policies as a whole, would you say...



Reform's manifesto polls very well with some people - but puts of others.

After the Conservatives', it is the manifesto that people are most likely to think represents more of the same, or that it will not do much to fix the country's biggest issues.

However there are segments of the population (for example Disengaged Traditionalists) who think the manifesto is for people like them and are more supportive of the policies than those in any other manifesto.





Increase the NHS budget by £8 billion in year one, with £28 billion extra by 2030

Introduce "rent controls", restricting the amounts that landlords can increase rent by each year

Increase taxes on the most wealthy people, to fund public services, including a wealth tax at 1% on the assets of people with more than £10m

Scrap university tuition fees and bring back maintenance grants

Bring forward the country's target to reach net zero by 2040, when it is currently 2050, with a huge rollout of renewable energy


Remove all nuclear weapons from UK soil and end the UK's nuclear weapons programme

More in Common The Green Party have a number of popular policies alongside a number of divisive ones.

Increasing the NHS budget and introducing rent controls lands well, but bringing forward the net zero target and removing our nuclear deterrent attracts more opposition than most of the policies we tested.

People overwhelmingly think that the Green's policies would represent change, but they are not convinced that this is necessarily the change we need.




For example, people tend not to think that the policies would not fix the country's biggest issues, and are more likely to think that the policies are overly ambitious than they are for any other party's manifesto.




Comparing the manifestos: do they meet the moment?

For all the manifestos tested, people are more likely to think they are too ambitious than not ambitious enough - although the plurality tend to think they are the right level of ambition. The Green Party's is notably more likely to be seen as too ambitious.


People are more likely to think that the right-leaning manifestos represent more of the same compared to the manifestos coming from progressive parties.




Comparing the manifestos: will they make things better?

The Labour party wins on whether the manifesto will fix the biggest issues in the country, whereas the Conservative manifesto is quite far behind the others.


The Liberal Democrats, on the other hand, narrowly beats Labour on the measure of whether the policies would help individual respondents


People think that Green policies would put their taxes up the most, although people don't tend to believe that any set of policies would lead to lower tax bills.

Reform and Conservative policies are seen to be least likely to increase taxes.




Emerging stories

The Liberal Democrats are making bigger gains from the Tories in Oxfordshire, Somerset & Surrey in particular. The Tories doing a bit better in holding against Labour in some parts of the South East and Outer London. But are doing worse everywhere else than last time, losing more seats to Labour in the Midlands in particular. 111 seats within 5 points - meaning a lot still to play for. If the Tories lose all of the marginal seats we project them holding right now they would end up close to just 100 seats, if they won them all they could hit 200.

Note: Longer fieldwork range might not have fully captured rise in Reform vote share throughout the campaign

More of the marginal seats in Scotland are projected to break for Labour from the SNP.

Blyth

All first time Conservative voters in 2019

Complete disillusionment in the Conservatives "Since covid they seem to have just lost sight about what politics is about. Nothing seems to be back on track. They're going backwards instead of forwards" Eve

Sky TV has cut through To come up with that was just a complete joke. It proves how much he's out of touch" *Micheal* **Complex views on Boris Johnson**

"He had his faults. But after the last election where it was a landslide in the North-East, he got his wellies on and came and spoke to us" *Eve*

No enthusiasm for Starmer at all... "I find him a bit bland. His voice is on the same level all the time. And he never answers a question" Steven ... and for most, support for Labour is soft "I'm not voting Labour because of Starmer. I'm voting because I want the Tories out" Ollie Farage seen as meeting the moment better than Starmer or Sunak "I like him. He's quite controversial but every time I see him he feels like he's talking to me" *Micheal*



All pensioners

Sense that politics has become more chaotic "We vacillate from one lunatic to another. It's not what I remember from years ago." Sean

Concerns that politicians speak too much about personalities and not enough about policies "We're not hearing about issues like the NHS that matter. They are just calling each other names" Sandra

Distrust in Labour to deliver their promises "Labour has no plan for what they'll do with the money. They are all as bad as each other" Tony

Sympathy for Sunak, and sense that he was a good chancellor.... "He was very very good as chancellor for businesses. I had a business at the time and he was very supportive" Stephany ... but D-Day has been a final blow for many Conservative voters "He had to be there to represent the country. He's the Prime Minister" Sandra Some tempted by the Lib Dems, although tuition fees are still front of mind "I'm tempted. He seems like a nice guy. I don't want to vote for Labour. And the Conservatives have lost me" Stephany

Wells and Mendip Hills

All Conservative 2019, currently Liberal Democrat or undecided

Disillusionment with the Conservatives

"I've just lost trust. It's impossible to know whether they will do what they say they will do" Sarah Sense that Brexit has made the Conservative Party dysfunctional "Brexit tore apart the Conservative party. And they still don't know what they are about" Victoria

Sense that immigration is a real issue, even if Rwanda is not the solution

"I don't like [Rwanda]. It's not dealing with the issue it's just hiding it. And it's too expensive. I don't understand why we can't send these people back to France" *Claire*

Low trust in Labour to deliver change

"They are all saying very similar things and just making promises that I don't believe." Ailish Willingness to accept different payment structures to fix the NHS "Putting taxes up doesn't fix it. The problem is the NHS is knackered. Noone is talking about the problems, they just say they're going to put the taxes up a bit" Kevin People want to like Ed Davey, but have noticed his stunts and wish he was a bit more serious

"I saw that video with the carers. And I thought he came across better than any of the others in that. I don't know why he's not like that when he's doing his stunts around the country." Victoria
